

COMMERCIAL COLT M1911 .45ACP GOES TO WAR!



WW1 started on 28 Jul 1914. The United States stayed neutral until April 6, 1917. Allied countries were in need of pilots and begun recruiting them from the US. The French recruited Americans into the famous flying Lafayette Escadrille.

At the time, Yale University had a Flying Club full of young men from a zenith of privilege such as Rockefeller, the son of the head of the Union Pacific Railroad. These young men were determined to be the first in combat if and when America joined the war in Europe. Many of these men left school in 1917 and headed up to Canada to join the RCAF (Royal Canadian Air Force), to England to join the RFC (Royal Flying Corps), later renamed RAF, (Royal Air Force) and to France.

Franklin Platt was one of these men. Franklin was a student at Yale and a member of the Yale Flying Club. In early 1917, he and 5 other classmates headed to England to became Flying Cadets at Oxford. They soon became known as the Oxford Cadets, a small group of American Volunteers. Lt. Platt was assigned to RAF 104 squadron flying Airco DH-9's. Other pilots from Yale went on to form the Millionaires Unit which became one of the first U.S. Navy Air squadrons.

In preparation before leaving the US, the first thing they did was to purchase their own personal firearms. They were not really sure if the British or French would be providing anything for them. Even if they had, most of these talented and wealthy Yale students did not care much for the revolvers that the British and French were using at the time.

In 1917, the Colt M1911 .45 ACP was new to the US Military. It was replacing the .38 Cal revolvers which fell short on knock-down power when needed. The M1911 had see use during the Punitive Expedition into Mexico in 1916. This small group of Yale pilots were unable to get their hands on any official US Government issued M1911's, but they could purchase their own commercially made M1911's to take with them. They quickly went over to the John Bassett & Co. Hardware store located near Yale and placed orders to purchase their private guns.

Colt records show that this M1911, serial number C96282 was shipped out along with 6 others on March 30, 1917 to Bassett & Co. This date was just before Platt and his fellow Classmates

headed overseas to England. In order to identify his pistol, Franklin Platt carefully scratched his name "Platt" into the finish just below the hammer on the right side. He carried this pistol during the entire war and then brought it back home.

On Sept 22, 1918, after serving in combat with the RAF 104 squadron, Lt. Platt was transferred over to the U.S. 100th Bomb Squadron, flying DH-4's.

Following the war, Lt. Platt served with the 101st ANG Squadron, based in Massachusetts. They flew Curtis JN-4's and Curtis O-11 Falcon's.

Singer Model 1911A1



You never know what will show-up at a Tennessee Military Collector's Show. A local Franklin man who lived less than 10 miles from the Show decided to bring his dad's service pistol to the 2021 Spring Show. He was looking to find someone with knowledge and information about the gun. His Dad was a pilot of B-17s in Europe and B-29s in Korea. He had been issued a Singer 1911. The Singer Model 1911A1 pistols are the most sought after of any Model 1911A1 pistol or for that matter probably any pistol that was produced and issued during WWII. It is a well-known fact that the Singer Manufacturing Company produced a total of

500 pistols under Educational Order W-ORD-396 in 1940. They exhibit the high polish Dulite blue finish with excellent fit finish and that all of these Singer produced pistols were issued to the US Army Air Corp as a service side arm for air crews. The Veteran's son had an opportunity to meet several knowledgeable dealers at the Show. He latter sold the pistol to Mr. Scott Gahimer a well-respected 1911 dealer and expert on Colt 1911 automatic pistols.
