

### WW1 German Navel Zeppelin Badge Found in Old Canadian House

A few years back, I was contacted by a young lady who purchased a fixer-upper house in Quebec, Canada. The house was sold to her by a gentleman who was moving into a nursing home. Unable to take much with him, he had no choice but to abandon many unneeded family items when he moved.

While cleaning out the house, the lady found some WW1 and WW2 German medals as well as a photo album from the 1950's. It became obvious that the photo album belong to a Karl Diehl, the former owner of the house, who is now deceased. The medals most likely belong to his father or some other relative. The veterans name still remains unknown to me at this time. Karl was born in Germany in the 1930's and later immigrated to Canada. These medals are not war trophy's brought back by a allied soldier. These are family heirlooms that have been left behind by a relative who could no longer care for them.

Included in the grouping, is an extremely rare WW1 German Navy Zeppelin (airship) crewman's badge.


All the items found show the veterans service in the Imperial German Navel Marinekorps and his Police service in Nazi Germany.

Also included is a sailor's cap-tally from the German training ship *Prinzess Eital Friedrich*. This ship was launched in 1909 as a full-rigged sailing ship. The ship has survived two wars and still exist today in Poland. It is currently named the *Dar Pomorza*.

The veteran of these medals most likely trained on the *Prinzess Eital Friedrich* around 1913 or 1914.

Looking at the medals, it's easy to get an idea of this Marine's interesting career. The bars (clasp) on the Flanders Cross (Marine Korps 1914/18) shows his Imperial Navel campaign service. He fought in the siege on Antwerp in 1914, the Battle of the Yser in 1914 and the 1st or 2nd Battle of Flanders 1914-1915.

The Hanseatic Cross from the city of Hamburg shows that he must have been from that area and had been decorated for valor.

The Gold 25 year Police long service medal indicates that following WW1, the veteran joined the German Police service and served for at least 25 years. His WW1 military service would have counted towards that 25 year award.

The 1936 Olympic medal shows that he most likely served as policeman with security details during the 1936 Berlin Olympic Games.

The rarest and most unusual item is the airship crewman's cloth badge. These badges were worn by qualified airship crewman and not by ground support personnel . They were worn on the left sleeve of the tunic.

Aircrews for the Zeppelins were recruited from other areas of the Navy, particularly from the navel Marine Korps.

Many of the smaller medals are from the NSDMB or National Sozialistische Deutscher Marine Bund. The NSDMB was a German Navy Veterans League, most of whom were from WW1. He was obviously very proud and an active member of several navel veterans organizations.

The search is still on for the exact identity of the veteran who owned these medals. The research and hunt is what makes part of this hobby so interesting.









#### - Russian SU-25SM Shot down 2 March 2022. Souvenir Hunting in Ukraine



On 2 March 2022 a Russian Air Force Sukhoi Su-25SM s/n RF-91961, code 07 red, from the 18th Attack shot down by Ukrainians using MANPADS and

crashed near the village of Vyshehrad, Bucha Rajon, Kyiv Oblast, The pilot, and escape back to Russian lines.

This practice is very similar to the French artisans at the end of WW1. The French gathered up empty shell casings and made them into decorative items to sell back to foreign troops as souvenirs. Yes, most of the "Trench Art" from WW1 was not made in the trenches. It was actually made by local French civilians and sold to doughboys as souvenirs.

I realize that most collectors shy away for dealing with any former Eastern bloc county on eBay. I shy away myself most of the time. When I saw these items from RF-91961 and how well they were documented in photos before being cut-up, I said to myself, what the heck. If I loose my money or if it's a scam, I can live with that loss

I made an offer (less than 1/2 the asking price). In my offer, I mentioned my interest in aviation history back as far as WW1 and WW2. My offer was accepted and my order was shipped fast. It arrived within weeks. The seller has over 500 reviews with 100% of them being positive.

When item was received, there was an added shoulder patch (used) from a Ukrainian Air defense unit, as well as a WW2 cap pin for Ukrainian Volunteers in the German army.



### Rare Guard Badges: Manhattan Project. Oak Ridge, TN. Atomic Bomb.



The Manhattan Project was a research and development undertaking during World War II that produced the first nuclear weapons. It was led by the United States with the support of the United Kingdom and Canada. From 1942 to 1946, the project was under the direction of Major General Leslie Groves of the U.S. Army Corps of Engi-



neers. Nuclear physicist Robert Oppenheimer was the director of the Los Alamos Laboratory that designed the actual bombs. The Army component of the project was designated the Manhattan District; Manhattan gradually superseded the official codename, Development of Substitute Materials, for the entire project.

In 1944, a billboard outside of Oak Ridge, TN contained a warning from a grimacing Uncle Sam, "Loose Talk Helps Our Enemy. So, Let's Keep Our Trap Shut." As the principal site of the Manhattan Project, the American-led effort to develop an atomic bomb before the Nazis did, Oak Ridge could not afford careless chatter. Known as the "Secret City", Oak Ridge had armed guards posted at all entry points.

These two badges were recently found in a antique shop near Oak Ridge. A small handful of them were sold of by the Army as scrap metal several years ago.
