FP-45 (Flare Pistol) aka: American Liberator Pistol, .45 ACP This particular weapon shown has early 1980's West German proof marks.



Most of us already know about the .45 Liberator Pistols of WWII.

1 Million were made at the cost of \$2.10 per unit. Production of the weapons was carried out at the General Motors, Guide Lamp Division plant in Anderson, Indiana.

Total production time from start to finish was about 11 weeks. It was nicknamed the "Woolworth Pistol" and it was joked that they were manufactured faster than you could shoot and reload one.



The FP-45 was a crude, single shot pistol designed to be cheap and quickly mass-produced. It had just 23 largely stamped and turned steel parts that were cheap and easy to manufacture. It fired the .45 ACP pistol Cartridge from an unrifled barrel. **Collector note:** Reproductions have a rifled barrel. They were distributed in a cardboard box with 10 rounds of ammo, 5 of which could fit inside the butt plate. A set of cartoon instructions was also included.

All the ammo issued with these had the head stamp **FA 42**. Ammo was packed in a 10 round flat box. **Collector note:** If you find FA 42 stamped .45 ACP still in the original 10 round flat box, it will bring a premium in price.

The idea of the weapon was to mass distribute them in occupied areas via any method possible to help arm the local populations. It as not intended as a front line weapon, It was designed to be used as a terror weapon or a cheap gun to kill someone and then take their weapon. "A gun used to get a better gun".

FP-45 (Flare Pistol) was a military designation given to the weapon as a cover story to hide their mass production.

Most never left the USA, however many were still sent all over the world. Agencies such as the OSS helped distribute them. Hundreds of thousands of those that were never issued, ended up being destroyed after he war.




West German EAGLE "N" proofs

I purchased this FP-45 in Germany during the mid 1980's while stationed at Hahn Air Base. The July 1982 issue of DWJ Magazine (Deutsches Waffen Journal) had advertise a batch of these for just 98 Duetches Marks each which was about \$40-45. I wish I had bought them all but I was not sure at the time if I could bring them back to the USA.

It is unknown how many were available at that time and the source of that batch of Liberators was kept a secret. All had been serial numbered by the West Germans. They were all Eagle "N" proofed and dated 1980 or 1982. The only factory marking was ".45 ACP" stamped on barrel.

Mine is serial number 53 and dated 1980. It is estimated that about 40 of

them were sold to US Servicemen such as myself and imported back to the USA. They were legal to purchase by US Military personnel via the US Rhein-Main Rod and Gun club and they were BATF approved to import without adding any additional US import marks.

February marked a great deal of activity on my Dallas built January 43 Ford GPW that has been off the road since July of 2016.

My jeep precipitated in the Keeneland concours in Lexington Ky in July of 2016 when I had a engine problem that forced me to find a replacement engine. After a year of searching I found a engine with a serial number that was very close to the GPW's original one and started to have the engine rebuilt.



The rebuild took over four years because of one incompetent machine shop and assembly tech that didn't know what he was doing and that forced me to have the engine repaired again by another machine shop that did an excellent job but took overall three years to correct all the problems from the first rebuild



I was able to get the engine back last year and started to work on getting her back on the road with this past February being the first time the engine was started. As you can see in the pic-

tures, I'm getting close and hope to have her done in time for the:


SOUVENIR HUNTING FROM DOWNED AIRCRAFT.

Tearing of fabric skin and cutting colorful metal panels from downed aircraft, was very popular on all sides during WW1 and WW2. Doing so was a unique war trophy to the victor and a proof of claim to the person who shoot the plane down.


During WW1 the airplane was a new concept and most soldiers had never actually seen one. The common solider very fascinated when he came across the wreckage of a plane. It was also very easy for him to cut off a piece, fold it up and send it home as a souvenir.

Manfred von Richthofen (the Red Baron) had a room full of souvenirs that he had sent home. These included tail numbers cut from planes that he had shot down. Richthofen's souvenirs' included weapons, engines, insignia etc., from his victims. He sent them to his mother who displayed them in her Berlin home. In 1945 the Russians overran her home, forced her to move out and none of Richthofen's souvenirs have been seen since.






